We can be the same way at church. Are these the right clothes? Is this the right jewelry? Do I have the right version of the Bible? Am I worshiping with enough sincerity? Our homes are there to provide comfort and protection and help us be a loving family, a place to be loved unconditionally. Ultimately, it should be a place to learn to become a valued and functional member of the family

of God. Do the little things we have and do in our homes reflect these larger goals? If they don't, maybe some adjustments could be made.

We also need to consider the big picture in our employment. Are we making our employer a profit? Remember he is not in business to provide us with a paycheck. That may be a part of his motivation, but he needs a profit to pay his bills and insure that success of the company.

Is the work we do pleasing to him and can we stand before God and honestly say that we performed to the best of the abilities we have been given? When it comes to our job will God be able to say of us, "Well done my good and faithful servants"?

Then what is the big picture at Church? It's not the clothes, the bible, or the position of our body; it's our relationship with God.

How well do we know Him – how He thinks, how He acts, what are His plans for us?

Are we comfortable being with Him?

If we are; then the little things like bibles, clothes, body stance, etc., etc., lose their primary significance.

Prayer turns into conversation, and is liberated from all of the negatives that are sometimes attached to it. It becomes as pleasant and natural as talking to our best friend. It is stripped of all time and place restrictions.
